New Jersey United States Senate Youth Program. Public and non-public high schools may nominate one junior or senior who has shown outstanding academic abilities and demonstrated qualities of leadership while serving in an elected or appointed high school office for the current school year. A student must be recommended by a high school principal and/guidance counselor in order to receive the application materials and the recommended student must submit his/her completed application packet by October 11, 2013. Each state nominates two students. The students receive a \$5,000 college scholarship and participate in a week-long program in Washington, D.C. with the costs paid for by the William Randolph Hearst Foundation. First Freedom Center announces the 21st annual **First Freedom Student Competition**. This **national essay and video contest** offers **9th - 12th grade students** an opportunity to compete for **\$2,500 awards** as they examine the history and implementation of freedom of religion and conscience in American democracy and the world today. This school year's topic asks students to write about international religious freedom. Students will be introduced to Article 18 of the 1948 Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Eleanor Roosevelt, and the place of religious liberty in U.S. history and U.S. foreign policy. Their task will challenge their analytic skills and require them to assess current-day events in terms of international human rights and history. The National Economics Challenge enables high school students to apply their knowledge of economics in a fun, challenging, and rewarding contest. The Adam Smith Division is for students enrolled in advanced placement economics or international baccalaureate programs and the David Ricardo Division is for students enrolled in one semester or less of general economic courses. The top four teams from the state competitions in each division come to New York City in May for the National Economics Challenge Finals. In the final rounds, the students answer rigorous questions on microeconomics, macroeconomics, international economics, and current events. The College, Career and Civic Life (C-3) Framework has been developed over the past three years by 20 states (New Jersey was not one of them) and 15 national organizations to help states update their social studies standards and to aid social studies teachers and supervisors strengthen their social studies programs. Use of the C-3 framework is voluntary. Although the New Jersey state social studies standards are not going to be revised any time soon, the C-3 Framework provides a conceptual structure of big ideas that can help teachers and supervisors frame curricular content.
