Maura explains: "iCivics presents students and teachers with a hands-on approach to learning civics. The multitude of subjects covered in the games allows teachers to match up almost any civics lesson with an application activity. Besides games, the iCivics website also contains curriculum units with individual lessons that can be easily accessed. Each student-centered, interactive lesson includes objectives, procedures, and necessary handouts. These resources can be used on their own as a complete course or as individual reinforcements to other lessons. I used the games and lessons in conjunction with the We the People middle school program and the two resources were able to be seamlessly used in conjunction with one another."

The **Constitutional Rights Foundation** is sponsoring its third annual First Amendment Cartoon Contest open to elementary, middle and high school students nationwide. The theme of this year's contest is Free Expression through the rights of the people to "peaceably assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances." This year's **Project Citizen Showcase** will be done digitally. Teachers may send one project (if you have many, send us the best one!) from grades 3-12. The digital portfolio may be in any digital format: a powerpoint, Photostory (available free online), a website, a DVD, a movie using Movie Maker (available free online) or other software, Live Binders (a free online source that allows you to create interactive "binders" online and to upload pictures, videos, and other interactive content), or any other type of computer-based presentation that you can send by link to a website. Teachers should send an email to civiced@njclre.rutgers.edu with the title of the project, teacher's name, grade, name of course, school and an email address where comments and questions related to the project can be sent along with a link to the project. The digital portfolio should identify: the problem selected and why it was selected; alternative policies; the policy selected and why; an action plan; reflections about the process and what was learned and a backup digital binder with research, letters, etc. We will accept portfolios through **May 2012**. Professional Development

Federal Trials and Great Debates in United States History, sponsored by the **American Bar Association and Federal Judicial Center**, is designed for teachers of U.S. history, government, civics, and law to deepen participants' knowledge of the role that courts have played in public controversies and defining constitutional rights. Participants work with historians, federal judges, and curriculum specialists to integrate landmark trials into their teaching. Institute 2012 will focus on three landmark federal trials. The institute will take place Sunday, **June 24–Friday, June 29, 2012**, in Washington, D.C.. Reimbursement for travel, lodging, and meal expenses follows U.S. government per diem rates. Participation is limited to 20 teachers. **Applications are due March 1, 2012** at www.americanbar.org/publiced.

Street Law, Inc. and the Supreme Court Historical Society will sponsor two sessions of the annual **Supreme Court Summer Institute, June 14–19 and June 21–26, 2012**. The Institute is open to secondary level social studies teachers & supervisors, who will spend five stimulating days on Capitol Hill and inside the Supreme Court learning about the Court, its past and current cases, and how to teach about them from top Supreme Court litigators and educators. Participants will also be present in the Court to hear the Justices announce the final decisions of the term and attend a private reception at the Court. The 15th annual Eisenhower Academy, a summer institute for teachers, will be held July 8–13, 2012, at Gettysburg College and Eisenhower National Historic Site in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Sponsored by the National Park Service, Gettysburg College, and The Dwight D. Eisenhower Society, the Academy presents an in-depth perspective of Dwight D. Eisenhower as president and world leader, and introduces effective strategies for teaching the Cold War era in the classroom. Lectures and discussion cover civil rights, the Cold War, 1950s economics, popular culture, and new scholarship on the Eisenhower Presidency. Field trips include a visit to the Eisenhower home and a guided walk through historic downtown Gettysburg to explore Eisenhower's life and times. Total cost, including field trips, special evening events, banquets, single occupancy lodging, and lunches is \$695 for early registration, by April 1. The late registration (through June 1) cost is \$750. Cost for day students is \$485. Professional education credits and graduate credits are available. 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Resources for Teachers

Trekking the Planet. On Jan. 28, 2012, two Trekking the Planet travelers will embark on a 426-day expedition to explore the cities, peoples, history, economics, topography, nature and customs of 50 countries in six continents, along with treks to 11 of

the world's most remote and unspoiled places. The mission of this venture is to provide free materials while enroute to help schools better educate students about human and physical geography. iCivics is designed to reinvigorate civics teaching through engaging games, lessons and other web-based materials at <http://www.icivics.org> for upper elementary and middle school grades. A new game, *Win the White House*, teaches students about the electoral process, the role of the Electoral College, and the influence of media in shaping public opinion by players running for president from the primaries through Election Day. Players have to make choices about their party, platform, vice president, and where to fundraise, poll, and spend their campaign dollars on appearances and advertisements as they strive for their 270 electoral votes. Project Citizen. Classroom sets of Level One (middle school) Project Citizen books are available for the cost of shipping, which is approximately \$18. Project Citizen involves both service learning and civic education. Students identify a local or state problem, research ways to resolve it, decide on the best solution and develop a plan for implementing it. In the process, students learn about federalism, public policy, how to influence change, and they improve their local community. A study by the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas found that students who participated in **Project Citizen** developed a greater understanding of the complexity of public policy, a commitment to active citizenship, and learned important communication skills. The materials set forth a process to help teachers guide their students through a project. The classroom set of materials includes 30 student textbooks plus a teacher's guide.
